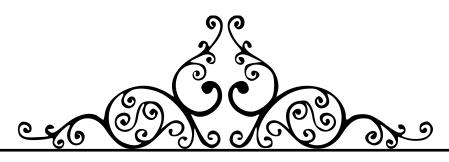

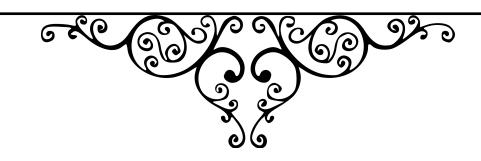

Commands, Examples, and Necessary Inferences Hugh Fulford

It has often been pointed out that God communicates in Scripture through commands, examples, and necessary inferences. This tripartite formula has been reduced to an acronym — CENI. By many in churches of Christ it has been viewed as a hermeneutic (a way of interpreting the Scriptures). While hermeneutical value is to be derived from recognizing commands, examples, and implications from which we draw certain necessary inferences, my contention is that commands, examples, and necessary inferences (CENI) are not themselves a hermeneutic but ways, means, or avenues by which God has set forth His will in Scripture and to which a valid hermeneutic must be applied.

"Command" does not really capture the fullness of what one intends to convey with this term. A more accurate way of stating the matter is to say that God communicates His will through various kinds of statements. Some statements may be declarative, such as the beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-12). These are not commands per se, yet all understand that Jesus expects His followers to possess these qualities. Other statements may be interrogative, hortatory, or imperative (having the force of a command). Of course, direct commands also are found in Scripture (cf. Matthew 22:37-40; Mark 16:15; Acts 10:48; 1 Corinthians 14:37; 2 Thessalonians 3:6; etc.).

Examples likewise are used by God to communicate His will to humanity. When God was ready to deliver His ultimate Word to mankind. He incarnated (made flesh) that Word in Jesus of Nazareth (John 1:14). "No one has seen God at any time. The only begotten Son, who is in the bosom of the Father, He has declared Him" (v. 18 NKJV). Literally, the word "declared" means "explained" or "exegeted." Thus, through Jesus Christ, God exemplified Himself so fully that Christ could say, "He who has seen Me has seen the Father" (14:9). Christ served as the perfect example of who God is and what He is like, and He serves as the example by which we are to live (1 Peter 2:21). Paul urged: "Imitate me, just as I also imitate Christ" (1 Corinthians 11:1). Numerous precedents and examples are found in the New Testament that God expects His children to follow today (cf. Acts 2:42; 20:7; 1Corinthians 16:1-2).

Regarding Acts 20:7, J. W. McGarvey made this insightful observation: "It is very generally admitted, even among parties who do not observe the practice themselves, that the apostolic Churches broke the loaf weekly; but it is still made a question whether, in the absence of an express commandment this example is binding upon us. This question is likely to be determined differently by two different classes of men. Those who are disposed to follow chiefly the guide of their own judgement, or of their denominational customs, will feel little influence by such a precedent. But to those who are determined that the very slightest indication of the divine

will shall govern them, the question must present itself in this way; 'We are commanded to do this in memory of Jesus. We are not told, in definite terms, how often it shall be done; but we find that the apostles established the custom of meeting every Lord's day for this purpose. This is an inspired precedent, and with it we must comply. We can come to no other conclusion without assuming an ability to judge of this matter with more wisdom than did the apostles.' "1

God also implies certain truths in the communication of His will to man. For instance, an orderly universe implies (and we infer) the existence of an all-powerful, all-wise and beneficent Creator (Romans 1:19-20; Acts 14:14-17). In refuting the Sadducees' lack of faith in the resurrection, Jesus pointed out that God is the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, but that He is not the God of the dead but of the living (Mark 12:24-27). Therefore, the Sadducees could necessarily infer that those patriarchs were alive. (Note: One needs to be careful to not use "implication" and "inference" interchangeably. A writer or speaker implies; a reader or hearer infers. A writer or speaker may definitely imply something that the inattentive reader or hearer never "picks up" on. On the other hand, a reader or hearer may unnecessarily infer something that the writer or speaker never at all implied!)

Thus, through direct statements, examples, and implications, God has communicated His will to us. However, statements, examples, and implications do not constitute a hermeneutic. It is after we have read the various kinds of statements, examined the numerous examples, and considered all the implications that we find in Scripture that the diligent work of interpreting God's word (employing a valid hermeneutic) and properly applying it to our lives then begins.

In recent years it has become fashionable among those who want to incorporate practices into the church that are not authorized by Scripture, and which denigrate and attempt to dismantle what they refer to as "the CENI hermeneutic." In so doing they attack a "straw man." I repeat: In my judgment, CENI is not a hermeneutic! Rather, to the statements, examples, and implications of Scriptures we must apply a valid hermeneutic. But we must respect what the Lord has communicated to us by means of direct statements (including commands), examples, and implications, and not add to, take from, nor substitute for that which He has revealed. "If any one speaks, let him speak as the oracles of God" (1 Peter 4:11).

Carrying Your Cross

This past Friday, commonly called in Christendom, Good Friday, I noticed numerous individuals and entire families carrying beautifully carved white crosses around the sidewalks of our fair community in Collierville, Tennessee. I do not mock those who were doing so because I am confident they are sincere, religious people, who, likewise, have a degree of courage to do what they were doing. However, I do believe they, along with many others in the religious world, are misguided concerning what it means to carry one's cross. It the same view that I hold toward those who allow themselves, for religious reasons, to be crucified on a cross to reenact what Jesus did or those who think they are doing the Lord a favor by showing up at a service because men have deemed a particular Lord's day as more holy than other Lord's days.

What did Jesus say about carrying one's cross? "And when he had called the people unto him with his disciples also, he said unto them, Whosoever will come after me, let him deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me" (Mark 8:34). Jesus died upon a cross. The cross is a means of execution. There is a sense in which Jesus calls upon each one of us to put ourselves to death and follow Him. When one is baptized into Christ such a person dies to the love and practice of sinning (Rom. 6:6). By so doing we deny ourselves and refrain from the passions and lusts that war against the soul. It is in this way that the Christian has taken up his cross and not by carrying on his back a piece of wood which symbolizes the instrument by which our Lord died.
