"He Brought Me Back To Christ"

Recently I preached the funeral service of one of my beloved high school teachers who, likewise, was a faithful child of God. While in my hometown for her service, a young lady whose family has long been acquainted with mine approached me and very lovingly embraced me while saying to others around us, "he brought me back to Christ." It was such a joy to hear these unexpected words. Evidently at some point in the past, after hearing me preach, she made the decision to be restored and is, once again, faithfully following her Lord. The gospel of Christ has such great power (Rom. 1:16) and is still convicting the hearts of sincere and honest people today. Her words were thrilling to my soul and a reminder that even when we don't realize it we are influencing men and women, boys and girls, to choose the Savior.

You do not have to be a preacher to win a soul back to Christ. In fact, God expects every one of His faithful children to be involved in restoring souls. This responsibility ought to be taken seriously because of the gravity of the condition of these erring brethren. Peter writes, "For if after they have escaped the pollutions of the world through the knowledge of the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, they are again entangled therein, and overcome, the latter end is worse with them than the beginning" (2 Pet. 3:20). But what needs to be done when one falls away? Such an individual needs to be converted again. This requires teaching again the fundamentals that led to this person's conversion the first time. James writes,

Brethren, if any of you do err from the truth, and one convert him; Let him know, that he which converteth the sinner from the error of his way shall save a soul from death, and shall hide a multitude of sins (James 5:19-20).

When I was a boy I enjoyed going with my dad to a potential convert's home to show the Jule Miller filmstrips. It could be those who have wondered away from God need to be taught these same lessons again. The story of the cross, Peter's sermon on Pentecost, the establishment of the church, and the sobering fact of the judgment day need to be reemphasized in the life of one who has erred from the faith.

If one is to be converted from the error of his way, he must continually see Christianity exemplified in your life and mine. Such a one needs to know that he is not our enemy but a brother we love and want to help (2 Thess. 3:15). This brother or sister needs to know that we are fervently praying for his/her restoration.

When a child of God is restored there is joy in heaven and on earth. My heart rejoiced knowing that through my teaching I helped a sister come back to Christ. However, a haunting question remains. Could it be possible that I have led someone away from Christ? I pray every day that if I have hindered anyone on the path that leads to heaven that God will forgive me and that my negative influence will be overcome by the good influence of another.

In heaven, there will be such exuberant joy in the hearts of every one of us to know we made it, and that, likewise, we are the reason others are there. As so beautifully stated in the following lyrics,

One by one they came, Far as the eye could see. Each life somehow touched by your generosity. Little things that you had done, Sacrifices made, Unnoticed on the earth, In Heaven, now proclaimed. [Editors Note: Recently I had the honor of delivering the funeral message of my former high school science teacher, Rubye Thomas, who passed away Friday, June 23rd in my childhood home of Stevenson, Alabama. Mrs. Thomas was also a faithful child of God. She was 92 at the time of her passing. Her son asked my to read the following poem, which I did at the conclusion of the service. I thought our readers would find much comfort in the poem, as well.]
